

Questions for Classroom Discussion"More of the Same..."

Why might someone want to clone their pet?

- ⇒ Consider the strong emotional tie people have with their pets, and how difficult it can be when that pet passes away (especially since most pets have relatively short life spans)
- ⇒ Consider the "cool" factor of this new technology, and how cloning a pet has the appeal of science fiction
- ⇒ Consider that cloning pets is a fairly harmless way to introduce new and controversial technology (as opposed to cloning humans or using DNA to revive extinct species)

What are reasons why people might be against the idea of pet cloning?

- ⇒ Consider the moral issues, and that cloning could be like "playing God"
- ⇒ Consider the simple economic issues—today, the cost to clone a pet is at least \$50,000; also, there are plenty of existing pets in need of good homes without having to clone a new one
- ⇒ Consider the fact that a "cloned" pet is not the original... environmental factors, experiences, and a variety of other influences play a huge role in how the new pet will look and behave

What should be the deciding factors to determine whether pet cloning is a good investment?

- ⇒ Consider the fundamental economic question—*Will pet cloning be a profitable?* (this comes down to whether enough people will be willing to pay the high price tag)
- ⇒ Consider factors that might turn investors away (such as the moral implications or the public viewpoint), even if the investment itself could be very profitable
- ⇒ Consider the <u>potential</u> of the investment... even if it is not profitable right now, does the technology of cloning have the potential to be very profitable down the road (and is there any advantage in investing early?)
