D: Solar Eclipse Story



What's the

Solar eclipses always generate a great deal of excitement... especially "total" eclipses (where the sun is completely blocked out). These events could certainly be the central focus of a great short story!

Your students must decide on the exact details of the short story that centers around the solar eclipse (plot, characters, setting, conflict) and write the first draft.

What would make a great eclipse story?

Students will review the details of Solar Eclipses and write a short story using the event as the central focus of the plot.

Lead a **class discussion** about issues related to the topic. You are being provided a sheet to help you guide the classroom discussion.

Extended Responses: Have students answer the following questions. Remind students to use information from the Stimulus Items to support their response.

- 1. Why do people get excited about Solar Eclipses? When they see one, what will it take to satisfy these high expectations?
- 2. What is the basic plot of a short story you'd like to read (but doesn't yet exist) that centers around a solar eclipse?

EXTENDED PRODUCT (Optional): Divide your students into groups, with each group forming a **Team of Authors.** Recognizing the excitement surrounding the upcoming eclipse, these authors have decided that people would enjoy a short story that is centered around the eclipse. Each group must come up with the details of this story (plot, characters, setting, conflict, conflict resolution), and then **write a draft** of this story. Obviously, the features of the eclipse (i.e. that it will turn dark for a couple of minutes in the afternoon) create an opportunity for the story to be different than most, but the authors must consider the usual elements that make a great short story.

Rubrics to grade student entries have been provided, and all questions have been mapped to the content standards.
