The Election: in simple terms

The Main Problem: When a major election gets close, it's easy to get lost in the political issues, poll numbers, and campaign ads. Of course, an election is simply the way we peacefully transfer power in our American democracy. How should this complicated process be presented to young people so that they understand the basics of our electoral process?

> How can we explain the "election"? Students will review the overall purpose and structure of a presidential (or local) election and decide on the best way to

explain those concepts.

Extended Responses: Have students answer the following questions. Remind students to use information from the Stimulus Items to support their response.

- 1. What are the key elements of our electoral process that everyone should know, even at an early age?
- 2. If your goal is to teach a young student about America's electoral process, what would be the best strategy? What types of materials would be needed?

EXTENDED PRODUCT (Optional): Divide students into small groups, and have each group write a short children's book or user-friendly **pamphlet** that is designed to teach young students about our electoral process. The groups must decide on the key features that should be highlighted, as well as the best way to present the material. Have the rest of the class play the role of a publisher of children's books, and the class can vote on which group's book would be worth publishing.
