Problem Title: The Holiday Dilemma

The Main Problem:



In the United States, there are only ten "national holidays" (in February, for example, Washington's Birthday is one, but Valentines Day is not). You are a Senator who will be reviewing the country's policy for creating national holidays. **What should the criteria be to make a day a "national holiday"?**

What makes a day worthy of being a national holiday?

Students will investigate different holidays to determine the common characteristics. They will consider the benefits of a national holiday in terms of costs and national pride.





***students should have access to their notes as they enter their answers

***students may also have access to the Stimulus Items as they enter their answers



Stimulus Item #1 - "How MLK Day became a holiday (article)

Stimulus Item #2 - "Push to Make 9/11 a Holiday" (video)

Stimulus Item #3 – "What Does it Take to Make a Federal Holiday?"

**Students should take notes as they review the Stimulus Items

Lead a **class discussion** about issues related to the topic. You are being provided a sheet to help you guide the classroom discussion.

Product Option: Using their notes and in pairs, students must collaborate to choose one celebration that has been submitted to become a national holiday.

- **Student 1 will create a one-minute speech** to bring before the senate (the class) to convince them to *allow* the new national holiday.
- Student 2 will create a one-minute speech to bring before the senate (the class) to convince them to *block* the new national holiday.

Each student must back up his or her opinion with reasons from the stimulus items. Take 3 volunteer groups to present their arguments to the senate (rest of the class), who will then vote on which motion to pass.

Extended Response Items: Have students answer the following questions using the online assessment system. Remind students to use information from the Stimulus Items to support their response.

- 1. Do you think the US should have more or less national holidays? Give two reasons to support your answer.
- 2. What do you think makes a day worthy of being a "national holiday"?

Rubrics to grade student entries have been provided, and all questions have been mapped to the content standards. Results can be analyzed through the online system.
