The Main Problem:

Your students will be viewing this problem from an integrated perspective.



You are the teacher on the first days of school. As you review what the class will be learning throughout the year. you must decide what kind of "assessment" (i.e. testing) to give your students. What is the purpose of giving tests, and which kinds are the best?

Students will review how standards are used to measure student progress, as well as different testing options, and then decide on the most effective assessment plans.

**Students should take notes as they review the Stimulus Items

Lead a class discussion about issues related to the topic. You are being provided a sheet to help you guide the classroom discussion.

Extended Responses: Have students answer the following questions. Remind students to use information from the Stimulus Items to support their response.

- 1. What is the purpose for testing (or "assessing") students in school? What are the ultimate goals?
- 2. What types of assessments and tests work best for students, and why?

EXTENDED PRODUCT (Optional): On the first days of the school year, a teacher usually shares his or her plan for assessing students throughout the year. Have your students "step into the shoes" of the teacher. They must outline the testing plan that they will share with the students. This should include a broad overview of the types of tests that will be used, as well as the overall purpose that the testing will serve. Another option is for the "student teachers" to write a letter home to parents that introduces the testing policy.

Rubrics to grade student entries have been provided, and all questions have been mapped to the content standards.
