The "Theme"

Route 66

Seligman, Arizona

Located along historic Route 66, this town features stores and souvenir shops that are a throwback to the days when the scenic highway was heavily travelled.



Old West

Tombstone, Arizona

In the 1800s, this town was a busy center of the Old West. Now, it is a tourist center for those who want to experience the Old West for a day.



<u>Amish</u>

Kalona, Iowa

This small town has a large Amish community, which prides itself on the simple things in life. Many stores focus on crafts that were handmade by Amish locals.



Olympics

Lake Placid, New York

This relatively small town in New York has hosted two Winter Olympic Games, and it is clear how proud the city is of this fact. Its sporting history has made it a hub of outdoor athletics even to this day.



1950s Amusement Park

Geneva-on-the-Lake, Ohio
